

# REMARKS

If you read these "reMarks" articles every month, you know that I typically write about a Biblical idea, a theological theme, or a church leadership topic. This time, I'm writing more personally, about a friend. This article has taken different shapes over the past few weeks, because my friend's health deteriorated rapidly from an aggressive cancer. He died on Friday, January 20. However, his impact will remain vibrantly within me and a countless number of people.Let me tell you about Robert "BJ" Jackson.

BJ was a dedicated & superb church musician. He grew up in a loving family in Homestead, Florida, where they were constantly active at their local United Methodist church. From an early age, his talent for singing was obvious. As a college student at the University of Florida (UF), BJ majored in pharmacy, sang in the glee club, and was active at University United Methodist Church & Student Center (UUMC). During this time, BJ and others formed the Maranatha Choir, a group of college students who would sing every Sunday morning for worship and tour at the end of each semester. During the last semester of his senior year, BJ gave up a lucrative career as a pharmacist, became a music major, and set out on a career in church music ministry.


In 1980, UUMC called him back to serve as the music director. Over the next 30 years, BJ would embody that local church's purpose of "connecting Christ, campus, and community." BJ led with tremendous energy, professionalism, integrity, and love. His infectious spirit drew people, including me.

I arrived on the UF campus in 1996, confident that I would be a math teacher. When I graduated in 2000, I was an active leader at UUMC, sang tenor in the Maranatha Choir, served for nearly two years as a lay supply pastor, and was on my way to seminary. What caused such a change? Answer: my experiences of God through the campus ministry at UUMC. And without a doubt, BJ's leadership set the scene for this to happen. It wasn't just how he directed the singing an anthem's musical notes; rather, it was allowing himself, his whole life, to be a vessel for the Holy Spirit. BJ genuinely experienced God's love in his life, granting him the assurance that he's was God's beloved. With that came tremendous freedom – free to love God through servant leadership, freedom to love other people.

I could write so much more, though I'm saving it for his memorial service on February 11. Five years ago, coming off a battle with cancer, BJ asked me to preach whenever that time would come. Through the years, he kept reminding me. Since then, he would have heart-related illness, and then this recent cancer diagnosis. It's almost like BJ presciently sensed his time on earth was coming to a close. So now is the time for me and those who loved him to collect the memories, recall the lessons, look upon old photos, watch concert footage, and be thankful for the life and ministry of Robert "BJ" Jackson. He would want us to keep singing and to keep loving each other.

To put it simply: I'm grieving the loss of an incredibly special friend. In deep and unspeakable ways, I am sensing God's comforting presence through prayer, and also singing old Maranatha anthems to myself. For example, we sang a choral arrangement of Psalm 121, "I lift up mine eyes to hills. From where comes my help? My help, it comes from the Lord, the maker of heaven and earth." In this grief, I am looking to the Lord for healing and strength. I see it and feel it coming.

# CHURCH HISTORY

"looking back... moving forward"

During the long history of institutional Methodism, our denomination has experienced many disagreements and divisions. Methodists split over slavery, lay leadership, bishops, and racism. Occasionally, after an extended period of separation, splintered denominations reunited. This happened in 1939 with the reunion of the Methodist Episcopal Church, the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, and the Methodist Protestant Church.

Today's dividing issues are homosexuality and church polity. The seed of discontent traces to the 1960s. Charles Keysor, an Illinois Methodist pastor, launched a movement to reverse what he considered Methodism's "rising tide of liberalism." He was a fundamentalist, believed in the inerrancy of the Bible, and used his training as a journalist to launch a new publication called GOOD NEWS. By the early 1980s, Good News had its own publishing house in competition with the Methodist Publishing House.

Other caucus groups espousing both traditional and progressive theologies soon appeared. What had once been a diversified denomination with a big theological umbrella became a deeply divided collection of special interest groups. Over the last 50 years, extreme positions on both ends of this theological spectrum hardened. Reconciliation has become increasingly difficult.

The spark that ignited the current demand for division came in 2016. The UMC's Western Jurisdiction consecrated the Rev. Karen Oliveto - an openly lesbian woman, as a bishop. The Book of Discipline did not change, but enforcement of its prohibitions against LGBTQ clergy proved impossible.

That event motivated conservatives to unite under a new organization called The Wesley Covenant Association or WCA. It first met in 2016 and laid the groundwork for a new denomination. They called their new church The Global Methodist Church or GMC. It officially launched on March 1, 2022.

A divorce is never pretty. Angry words have been exchanged. Feelings have been hurt. Congregations are divided. Truth is usually the first victim of any legal separation. That is the case with Methodism's current splintering.

Covid-19 has exacerbated the separation. The General Conference has final authority over all UMC legislation. It has not met since 2019 due to the pandemic and will not meet until 2024. It alone has the authority to speak for the whole church. That administrative silence has created a leadership vacuum.

The 2019 General Conference did approve a process for disaffiliation for any church that wants to leave the denomination. This process requires a two third affirmative vote of an individual congregation's entire membership and the payment of all connectional related financial obligations. This obligation includes 100% apportionment payment for the current conference year and the next year, payment of any unfunded pension liabilities, and payment of all legal expenses involved in the disaffiliation. The full details of this separation document appear in a Book of Discipline insert as ¶2553. Full compliance with this paragraph will allow a congregation to leave the UMC and retain property ownership. This exit process must be completed before December 31, 2023.

Some disaffiliating churches have already indicated their intention to join the GMC. A few exiting churches intend to join a yet to be named progressive Methodist Church. Many, however, are uncertain about their future and will continue as independent churches. Most congregations will remain part of the UMC. One thing is certain. In the future, The United Methodist Church will be weaker in both its mission and outreach after even one local church departs.






