



Let's get healthy in 2022! I'm not just thinking physical exercise and eating better. What about improved spiritual health?

In January, our church is launching an emphasis on "emotionally healthy spirituality. "Ponder these three words strung together, and begin to imagine what your life can be with a healthy spiritual life. Picture how it's connected to your emotions. And now, wonder with me about the outpouring of blessing upon your life, your family, and our community when we set out to improve our spiritual health.

Pete Scazzero first introduced me to the concept of "emotionally health spirituality." It happened nearly ten years ago during a continuing education event. Scazzero was presenting on the theme, which he developed based upon his experience as a pastor. He recognized that many church people claimed to be Christian, but had not experienced a profound change deep within their lives. As he explored this more, Scazzero started noticing patterns. As Scazzero puts it: "It's impossible



to be spiritually mature while remaining emotionally immature." With some more research and development, he began inviting church members to make new connections: who they are and who God is calling them to become.

Now Scazzero, his wife Geri, and their team lead an entire "Emotionally Healthy" ministry, with print materials and website resources. In the coming months, you will have opportunities to join me and other church members to go about this spiritual formation paradigm.

What will we do? First, I will introduce related themes through some sermons, writings, and videos in January. Second, those who are interested in are invited to read & ponder the book Emotionally Healthy Spirituality. The church office has several copies available, or you can buy a copy from your favorite bookseller. Third, I will host info sessions; see schedule below. The purpose of these info sessions is to gauge your interest in digging deeper either one-on-one or in groups.

During the year 2021, we read "The Story" found in the Bible. To kick off 2022, we will now consider our own personal stories in light of God's story. I believe that this will bring healing to us, and even to our families and our beloved congregation. Make no mistake: it's entirely is the work of the Holy Spirit. For this healing work to be activated, we must participate. After all, your story is not yet finished!

"Looking back, moving forward"

Our next chapter as The Church

During the Christmas holidays, I saw a catalogue advertisement for an unusual sweatshirt. Like so many other popular items, the front carried a thought provoking observation. It said, "Don't look back. You aren't going in that direction."

A part of me really likes that quote. You may find that odd coming from a historian, but it is the truth. Life does not have a reverse button. We only move forward.

Even so, I frequently hear pandemic weary people say, "I can't wait for things to get back to normal." Covid-19 has upset everyone's life. Churches have been particularly hard hit. It is difficult not to be nostalgic about how things used to be.

Yet here is a spoiler alert. We can never recapture the past. We are living into a new normal. Individuals and churches must move forward not backward.

Recently Pastor Mark's sermon included a timely quote from Søren Kierkegaard. Kierkegaard said, "Life can only be understood backwards, but it must be lived forward." I think that is the key to studying history. It is why I call this column "Looking Back, Moving Forward." The past helps us understand the present, but the future will always be more than a resurrected past.

This is the perfect time to look both backwards and forwards. January was named for Janus a two faced Roman deity. One face looks forward and the other backward. January invites us to look in both directions. Rather than focusing on a specific historical event, I want to digress and ask, "Why do we study history?" We are not going in that direction. But I believe our future will be defined by how well we understand the past. Here are a few examples.

Corporate worship has long formed the core of congregational life. Our predecessors built a large sanctuary and balcony at First United Methodist Church designed to seat 660 people. They envisioned a future growing population with an ever increasing church attendance. Sadly, it will be a long time, if ever, before some people gather without fear in crowds. How can our future corporate worship meet this challenge?

Food and fellowship have been the heart of Christianity since Jesus ate with his disciples. During the earliest days of the Christian church, communal meals united Christians in a Holy Communion. Could church meals in private homes and other small group settings fulfill that same function today?

Methodism originally thrived in small groups called classes and bands. They met in neighborhoods and included only 10-12 participants. In more recent times, the Sunday school became the primary Christian entry point for new believers. Today, many of our Sunday school rooms are empty on Sunday mornings. Are there new ways for the church to support faith formation in a scattered post-pandemic world?

Think about touching and other acts of physical contact. Jesus healed with a touch, and we still need to touch each other. How can we do that in a contagious world?

Over the next twelve months, I will address some of these issues as we look backwards and move forward. Beware of any preacher or politician who promises to recreate our past. It is gone forever. We can't go back. Most of the saints I knew growing up at First United Methodist Church rest eternally from their labors. Our task in 2022 is to learn from what they did and with God's guidance build a better future.



GENEROUS GIFT FROM MARY ANNE LANINGHAM

Laningham Estate Gift

Mary Anne Laningham was both a gift and a giver. The recent bequest of \$998,701 from her estate to the First United Methodist Church endowment fund is but the latest evidence of her generosity. Proceeds from this gift will help provide for the maintenance of the church physical plant and properties, thus meeting a significant need. The church was also named as a beneficiary of a \$71,000 life insurance policy which Mary Anne left to be divided between our church and her home church in Virginia.

Music Department of the church a Steinway piano. That piano is now used in the sanctuary during our worship services. A plaque acknowledging this gift is located in the music suite. This gift was a testimony to the value Mary Ann placed on the inspiring music provided by the church.

Her obituary described Mary Ann as "a tireless woman" and an "active member of several community organizations in Salisbury. She held leadership roles at First United Methodist Church . . . and Church Women United." Her other interests demonstrated her "tirelessness" and her zest for life. For example, she was a "member of the American Volkssport Association in which she completed 10Km walks in all 50 states and several other countries" on six continents; and she delighted in sharing the stories of these adventures with friends.

Mary Ann had an infectious smile, and she was an engaging conversationalist. She truly gave generously of her material wealth to our church and the Salisbury community, but through her personality and her expressions of her faith, she was a gift herself to all who knew her. We give thanks for her life and her gifts.

FUMC preschoolers raise \$285.47 for Christmas Happiness Fund from loose change

"Some things are certain about the holidays in Salisbury. Crews lift a star over the middle of the Square, crowds line the street to watch the city's annual Christmas parade, a cadre of singers serenade attendees of First Baptist Church's living Christmas tree, Salisbury Police partner with Gerry Wood Auto Group to give bikes to children and preschoolers at First United Methodist Church make the short trip to the Salisbury Post to deliver their Christmas Happiness Fund donation.

This year, the youngsters raised a total of \$285.47 for the Christmas Happiness Fund, which the local Salvation Army uses to ensure children receive gifts. The preschoolers on Friday formed an orderly line in the Post's lobby and carefully dropped the donation into a golden Christmas Happiness Fund box.

Kelly Austin, the preschool director, said the children brought in change this month and last. Sometimes, the donation is boosted by an adult donation, but this year's sum was almost entirely comprised of loose change, Austin said.

Austin says fundraising is accompanied by a lesson that starts before Thanksgiving about being thankful and about needs versus wants. Throughout November and December, change is collected in plastic cheeseball containers decorated with fall leaves, she said.

It's routine by now for adults at First United Methodist Church's preschool, but Austin said it's still exciting for the children. They enjoy watching the total grow larger every day, Austin said."


We had a special time together as church members drove by the house, stopping to talk and share very sweet birthday greetings. God also gave us a beautiful day and warm temperatures.
