"Will people come back to church?"

That's a question many people have been asking over this past pandemical year. As people settled into new routines, not being physically present on the church grounds became the way of life. You know this. You may also know the surprising joy of worshipping from home thanks to the worship videos. With a coffee in one hand and a plate of waffles in the other, who could ask for anything more?!

With more people receiving the vaccine, the COVID-19 numbers are dropping. As a result, more people are feeling comfortable being out and about, and that includes coming to church for worship, classes, and other gatherings.

The Gallup Poll and The Barna Group have continued their national data work over this past year, attempting to hazard an educated guess at how many people will indeed come back to church. They rely on surveys & social science statistics, such as death rates, birth rates, and presumed variations among generations. If you're interested in such things, do a search online to read more. This fascinating information always piques my curiosity. Through my life as a pastor, however, I've come to sense what ultimately determines whether a person will come back to church: *receiving a warm welcome from people who genuinely seek to share God's love*.

This singular reality will directly influence whether or not someone will come back to church. More impactful than any program and more alluring than any building, the way people are invited and welcomed makes all the difference. And you can personally make that difference!

I believe that we have a unique opportunity right in front of us, because as we emerge out of the pandemic, people are experiencing transitions with work, family, or culture. They are naturally facing vulnerable moments. Such vulnerability may incline a person to receive what the church has to offer: loving community, resources, encouragement, opportunity to serve, just to name a few. Meanwhile, their vulnerability may spawn some questions related to how they schedule their time; questions like... Should I go visit my grandchildren? Will our child be on that traveling team again? What weekend getaway is luring me away? What new hobby do I want to try? Should I stay home? And even...Does church even matter anymore?

Based on what I'm hearing, a wide swath of people are eager and ready to return for worship! Many others are content to stay home. Still others have developed some real fears preventing them from even trying: agoraphobia (fear of leaving the house and being in other places), claustrophobia (fear of being in closed spaces), or even anthrophobia (fear of being with other people). I'm hopeful that we, as a community of Christian faith, can be patient and loving with everybody, no matter what.

In the meantime, we can do two things:

- 1. Courageously embody an authentic faith in Jesus Christ through every dimension of our lives.
- 2. Look for people to encourage, support, and invite to worship with you.

We can do this, because YES, church does matter – perhaps more than in any time in recent memory. Let us be a faithful group of Christians in the Methodist tradition, so committed to loving God and one another, that people are compelled to come back to church!

# CHURCH HISTORY

"Looking back, moving forward"

Christian worship and secular festivals have often merged over the last two millenniums. Sometimes it is hard to tell the two apart. For example, in the first centuries of the modern era, Christians transformed pagan sun worship into what we call Christmas. The reverse happened in medieval Europe when secular Mardi Gras or Fat Tuesday's revelry proceeded somber Ash Wednesday. Even Holy Easter has become for some people a secular celebration of spring and candy-carrying bunnies.

Today there are many secular celebrations that seem almost sacred. They include New Year's Day, President's day, Father's Day, July 4th, Labor Day, and Thanksgiving. For sports fans that list includes Super Bowl Sunday, March Madness, and the World Series.



**Anna Jarvis** 

Thanks to a Methodist laywoman named Anna Maria Jarvis, the second Sunday in May now belongs to Mothers. She never married or had children, but she idolized her mother. Noting that all national celebrations honored men, Anna felt there should be a day to honor women. When her mother died in 1905, Anna began a secular campaign to establish just such a holiday.

Grafton Methodist Episcopal Church in West Virginia hosted the first Mother's Day celebration. By 1911, Mother's Day was celebrated in almost every state in the Union. On May 8, 1914, President Woodrow Wilson signed a joint resolution designating the second Sunday in May as Mother's Day.

Commercial interests quickly took over this new holiday. Florists and greeting card companies made huge profits. Anna was appalled at the commercialization. She never imagined people would buy greeting cards when they were perfectly capable of expressing their love for their mother in their own words. She even launched a campaign to call off Mother's Day, but she had lost control of the simple holiday she created.

At that time the Methodist Church also began to rethink Mother's Day. Some women felt left out because they never had children, by choice or by infertility, or their children had died. Other women bore children but were never good mothers. Most local churches celebrated Mother's Day, but it never became an official Methodist holiday.

Rather than celebrating Mother's Day, The United Methodist Church encourages local congregations to use the month of May to emphasize "ways congregations can support families within the congregation and in the home, participate in prayer on behalf of all families, and provide ministries for forming and strengthening healthy relationships in the home (Book of Resolutions #2024)."

Most local congregations still honor Mothers and Fathers on their respective secular holidays. However, today's world desperately needs stronger families. If Methodist churches use the month of May to focus on uplifting families as a holy practice then Anna Jarvis' true vision will not be lost.

We are excited to announce our new online church directory will launch in May!


It contains most members, staff and some active friends of the church. The directory is password-protected and only available to members of our church family. You control how much information to share.

# INTERGENERATIONAL MISSION TRIP

#### **Mission Trip to D.C.**

July 10-16 FUMC is preparing to send a small team of short term missionaries to the Washington DC area. We will be partnering again with Praying Pelican Missions. PPM is a wonderful mission partner. I love working with them because their vision for short term missions is to match up people who want to go and serve with a local church in the area we will be serving. We work alongside the local church, offering extra hands,



fresh energy, and sharing resources to bless the neighborhood. That way when our trip is over, the local church can continue to be the connection point for the people we serve!

**Why DC?** As we looked for a destination for this year's trip, we knew we wanted it to be within driving distance. The city of DC is only about 6 hours away, and it's an important city for so many reasons. National decisions are made there, it's a center for culture and art where many of the museums are free, it's a place that makes history every day. And it's also a city of incredible diversity racially and socioeconomically.

What will we do? We are going to be serving as part of a team with Hayes United Methodist Church in Silver Spring, MD (on the outskirts of DC metro area). Hayes UMC is a church in a primarily Hispanic neighborhood. They offer worship services in both English and Spanish. The church has a vision for starting a summer ministry for children that would help meet the need of summer child care, particularly for school age children who stay at home while their parents are working. Our main task will be helping them create their vision by leading children's programming that week!

# ITINERACY: WHY DO PASTORS CHANGE CHURCHES?

I am both a Pastor's Kid (a PK- as we call ourselves) and a United Methodist Pastor, so I have two views on this question. United Methodist clergy are itinerant- we move around. We are appointed year-by-year by the Bishop, but are eligible to have shifts in appointments mid-year if there is a sudden change that requires this. An itinerant system like ours is the alternative to what is a call system. Other downtown churches have this sort of system. A few years ago, First Presbyterian needed a new senior pastor. After 2 years of issuing a call, they received The Revs. Lara & Josh Musser Gritter as their new senior copastors (Duke classmates of mine). Within our connectional and itinerant system, where there is an opening for a pastor, the new one moves in that same day!

Bishop Paul Leeland, our bishop in the Western North Carolina Conference, is fond of reminding us: the early church sent people to places of ministry, churches did not request that their new pastor be Paul or Lydia or Barnabas or Ruth. This pattern is continued in Methodism. In a letter to the Rev. Samuel Walker in 1756, John Wesley wrote, "We have found by long and consistent experience that a frequent exchange of preachers is best. This preacher has one talent, that another; no one whom I ever yet knew has all the talents which are needful for beginning, continuing, and perfecting the work of grace in a whole congregation."

There is beauty and challenge in any system of church- but I believe this set of challenges and joys is the best arrangement. This is why I can agree to this system as part of my ordination on June 19.

First, the challenges: It is hard for churches to say goodbye to pastors they love, and it is hard to say goodbye to churches and people we love as pastors. As a lay person, you may feel connected to some pastors more than others- but in time, another will come along. And, frankly, some of the most important lessons of my life came from time spent with people I did not get along with. Likewise, some of the most important lessons came from pastors and teachers that I felt close to. Unfortunately, sometimes people try not to form relationships with pastors because they will eventually move. Sometimes, people try to urge the system along faster than it should go, and end up damaging the church for whom they claim to be acting out of love. Also, it is hard on pastor's kids to be held to a higher standard, to be scrutinized (even unintentionally), and to hear criticism of their parent.

Now, the beauty. Our Bishop is able to look at the whole of the system of churches and pastors (with lots of help of the District Superintendents- together known as The Cabinet) to send churches the pastors whose gifts and graces they need for this particular chapter in their history. You all can point to a church that you know about locally or nationally that has become more about the pastor than the church members. Church IS the people- the ministry is yours. The ministry of pastors is to help you live out yours. It is a problem when churches abdicate this responsibility to paid clergy only. Sometimes churches (and pastors) know what they want, and don't know what they need. Our system frees pastors and



churches up to do hard and fruitful work of ministry for the sake of God's Kingdom, and not necessarily our comfort. This is the beauty that has brought me to you, to be richly blessed by your nurture and care, and sends me onward to meet a whole new beautiful set of people with their joys and challenges. They and I will always be blessed by the relationships and lessons and grace absorbed here.
