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REMARKS

We can all use a laugh these days. Try this one... Why do golfers wear two pairs of pants? Before I tell you the punchline, let's be real about life.

Life's challenges always have a way of hardening us, and that is especially true in recent months. Making our way through the pandemic has caused us to be weary. Watching unreal news stories has caused us to be deeply saddened. Listening to the national debate over civil rights, the economy, healthcare, and education has caused us bewilderment, even wondering where we belong. Mix in some violent action along with violent rhetoric. What's the result? A need to laugh!

Did you know that laughing is good for your physical health? According to the Mayo Clinic, laughter has many benefits (www.mayoclinic.org). For starters, laughter can help a person experience relief from stress, because the stressor is temporarily not the focus of attention. The experience cools down the stress response, which benefits one's heart rate and blood pressure. Have you ever noticed that when you laugh, not only is your mental load lightened, but also it helps bring positive physical changes, too? Laughter enhances your intake of oxygen-rich air, which stimulates many organs. Also, there is real medical evidence showing how laughter improves your immune system, relieves pain, and improves your mood. We have all experienced this. We know it to be true. Then why do we get so dour when it comes to religion?

I suspect that it comes from our sense of reverence. We inherited it. For those of us who grew up in the church, it started when we were made to sit still and be quiet. A stern look from mother – or even worse, grandmother! – was all we needed to straighten up. Sometimes a candy bribe operated here. I am curious about what motivated the adults who kept this rolling. Was it a sincere desire to bring about devout holiness within the children? Or a fear that their family would get a reputation? Maybe, if we're being honest, a mix of the two? Whatever the motivation, a definition of reverence developed that insisted upon a stiff facial expression, leaving little room for laughter.

What would faith look like if you laughed more, especially if you laughed with fellow Christians? No, we will not replace liturgy with a Saturday Night Live sketch. And yes, we need to take seriously the real problems we are all facing, for the sake of bringing God's healing love to our community. I think we can lighten up a little bit, though. It just might help the message connect! After all, as Elton Trueblood (who spoke at our church in the early 1970s) wrote in his book, The Humor of Christ, our Lord Jesus Christ used irony and exaggeration in his teaching. For example, remember Jesus' teaching on hypocrisy, talking about a beam in a person's eye (Matthew 7:5). "The humor of Christ is employed," wrote Trueblood, "only because it is a means of calling attention to what would, without it, remain hidden or unappreciated. Truth, and truth alone, is the end (page 52)."

I believe that we can be real about life's challenges, and face the future unafraid by the power of Holy Spirit. By God's grace, you can know the truth, and the truth shall set you free – free to laugh! May our desire for truth not make us dull, but lead us to enjoy life abundantly (John 10:10).



CHURCH HISTORY

"Looking back, moving forward"

Methodists talk a great deal about John Westley. We should. He organized the Methodist movement into a vital spiritual force that transformed eighteenth century England and America. He published sermons and notes on the New Testament that laid a sound theological foundation for our denomination's future.



However, his younger brother, Charles, also played an important role in Methodism that we often overlook. For example, Charles Wesley was actually the first Methodist. Charles invited a few young gentlemen at Oxford University to enter into a disciplined life covenant with him. Other ridiculing students nicknamed them the "Methodists." When his brother John later returned to Oxford as a teacher, he assumed leadership of their little Holy Club.

Charles Wesley avoided the limelight and lived in his big brother's shadow. After graduating from Oxford and taking holy orders, he served as General George Oglethorpe's personal secretary. Americans remember Oglethorpe as the founder of Georgia. Charles convinced his brother John in 1735 to go with him to Georgia as a missionary. At that time Georgia was settled primarily by prisoners released from jail as forgiveness for debts and other minor crimes. It was a difficult experience for Charles living in primitive conditions on Saint Simons Island among disreputable neighbors. He quickly returned home to proper English society. One writer summarized his character saying Charles, "was modest, yet strong-willed; frail, yet a fighter; hot tempered, yet gentle and forbearing; a strict Churchman, yet an ardent Methodist."

In early May of 1738 Charles Wesley had a spiritually transformational experience. A few days later he took his reluctant brother to an Aldersgate prayer meeting in London. There John had his own life-changing, heart-warming experience. The Methodist revival followed and quickly spread through outdoor preaching. Modesty made Charles reluctant to face large crowds. Even so, he developed a remarkable preaching ability. On one occasion he addressed as many as 10,000 listeners. Charles Wesley's greatest gift to Methodism is his hymns. Our current United Methodist Hymnal contains fifty of his compositions including "O For a Thousand Tongues to Sing," "Hark! the Herald Angels Sing," and "Christ the Lord Is Risen Today." We will look more closely at his hymns in future Ecclesia articles.

Charles Wesley's hymns put his brother's theology into verse. To this day Methodists sing our theology. During months of Covid-19 confinement, we have missed those hymns. Even if you do not have a good singing voice, making a joyful noise unto the Lord lifts your heart to God. As John Wesley admonished in his directions for singing, "If [singing] is a cross to you, take it up, and you will find it a blessing."

First United Methodist Church is fortunate to welcome our new director of music Joshua Starnes. He arrives well qualified for this key leadership role. Joshua of Old Testament fame blew his horn and the walls of Jericho fell (Joshua 6:20). In the tradition of Charles Wesley we believe our Joshua will use both piano and organ to fill the walls of our church with praise and glory. It is our Methodist heritage.

DEVOTIONS FROM PASTOR STACEY

In a time of disrupted rhythms & routines, we must be intentional about forging a rhythm of Sabbath. We encourage you to keep joining in worship on Sunday at 11 via livestream as an intentional, central Sabbath practice. We must be intentional to create Sabbath space, rest, and practice to anchor our day, our week, and our life in God.



Week 1: Blest be the tie that binds our hearts in Christian love the fellowship of kindred minds is like to that above.

Colossians 3:14-15

The highest ideal of Christian life is love. Jesus affirmed that the goal of God's law was to point us to twofold love- of God and neighbor. This takes time and effort on our part, but this growth in grace comes only by basking in the love that God shines down

upon us. We receive love, and we learn to reflect that love back to God and to neighbor (and even to our self!). This is the idea of Christian Perfection- that over time we may love more perfectly, more truly, more divinely. Learning to love is hard and messy and requires community- but love binds us together while we live together. Blessed be the tie that binds!

• Where do you feel friction between the appeal in Colossians and your daily life? Ask Christ to help 'clothe' those places with the gifts of love and peace.

Week 2: Before our Father's throne we pour our ardent prayers our fears, our hopes, our aims are one, our comforts and our cares.

Hebrews 4:1-16

Have you ever felt the prayers of others lifted for you? Knowing people are calling upon God for you at the time of an important test or procedure, giving thanks for you on your birthday, or upholding you in a time of need is a divine experience. During intercessory prayer in worship, we say, "Lord in your mercy: hear our prayer." One prayer. We are individuals with different things upon our hearts, but yet in prayer we are unified. We pray one prayer together, through Christ Jesus the one High Priest who forever intercedes for us with the Father through the power of the Spirit. It is especially comforting when we are not able to gather as we would like.

 Ask the Spirit who you might pray for this week. Who are you called to be connected to through prayer, even across space?


LORD IN YOUR MERCY hear our prayer

Week 3: We share each other's woes, our mutual burdens bear, and often for each other flows the sympathizing tear.

Galatians 6:2

Some may think that showing your "polish" and pedigree is what will earn you respect and connection with others. Those who have studied connection point instead to vulnerability: being open to share your authentic self, your pain, and your joy. Not only does vulnerability allow you to share your self, but allows you to be open to the experiences of others.

The cross that Christ commands us to pick up and follow is heavy. But we do not do this alone, either. Sharing our burdens with one another makes the whole load lighter, not unlike the old 'barn raisings' where the whole community together is able to pick up a load together for the sake of building.



Are you struggling? Call a friend this week to first listen to their struggle and to share your own.
 Praying out loud is scary for many people- but perhaps you can even be so bold to pray together about your struggles.

Week 4: When we asunder part, it gives us inward pain but we shall still be joined in heart, and hope to meet again.

Revelation 21:3-4

One meaning of "binding" is the edging sewn on fabric to lend strength. Think of how a button hole is formed: many loops of thread surround and bind the edges of what would otherwise be a cut in the fabric (prone to tearing further). The tie that binds us- the love of Christ- also binds the edges of our lives such as pain, loss, and grief. Instead of these tearing us completely, the grace of God binds them up for the sake of our salvation.

Salvation is not limited to the certain hope of resurrection and reunification with those we miss on this side of eternity. That hope gives us the freedom to live into the salvation offered to us here and now- the transformation of our affections (including the way that we love) and our actions.

• When we join the local church, we pledge our prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness. These are signs that Christ's love binds us together, and signs of the work of God in our lives. Stewardship is about all of these aspects of our life. Ask God to show you how to make the next faithful step in prayers, presence, gifts, service, and witness.

A NOTE FROM THE BUSINESS ADMINISTRATOR

At the end of August FUMC received \$40,167.65 for the month. Our expenses totaled \$85,018.47, leaving a month end deficit of (\$44,850.47). The year to date income for the church is \$556,391.45 as of the end of August, and the year to date expenses are \$339,737.47. This has left the church with \$176,540.41 in the bank; however, please keep in mind that included in our year to date income is the money received from the PPP Loan of \$178,000.
